# A message from the Executive Director

Being proactive also applies to our staff and board, below are some of the ways the MFRC prepared for the road ahead.

The MFRC successfully achieved accreditation under the Canadian Accreditation Council (CAC). As one of four MFRCs participating in the pilot program, accreditation was a process that began in October of 2014 and was completed at the end of August 2016. Accreditation is one more step we can take to ensure that the MFRC follows processes based on best practice standards and promoting service excellence.

An increase in the need for support to the youth of military families prompted to pilot a Youth Worker position for one year. The MFRC Youth Worker implements and delivers crisis intervention, and short-term support services and programs to military and veteran youth, ages 9-17 as well as their families. The mental health and well-being of children and youth remains one of our top priorities, we have turned the pilot position into a permanent one.

#### **ABOUT US**

The Edmonton Garrison Military Family Resource Centre (MFRC) is a non-profit society registered under the Alberta Society's Act. The agency is also registered with Revenue Canada as a charitable organization.

The MFRC is committed to enriching the lives of individuals and families in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) through positive action, education and support.

Absences from family support systems, difficulties during deployments, solo parenting or coping with an injury or loss are realities for military families: realities which can have a significant impact on family wellbeing.

For over 25 years, the MFRC has been committed to supporting military families as they navigate these unique challenges through programs and services that enhance the strength and resilience of military families.

#### **OUR STRUCTURE**

We are governed by a volunteer Board of Directors comprised of military family members, CAF members, and ex-officio members. The MFRC depends on the talents and skills of these dedicated volunteers to make guiding decisions. At least 51% of the Board membership must be civilian family members of full-time serving CAF personnel. Qualified staff from a variety of backgrounds direct and coordinate MFRC programs and services.

#### **MISSION**

The Edmonton Garrison Military Family Resource Centre supports military families as they navigate the unique challenges of military life through programs and services that enhance their strength and resilience.

#### **FUNDING**

The MFRC is funded through four major areas, each separate but equally important. These funding sources include: Base Commander; Military Family Services (MFS); Program Fees; and Fund Development.

#### **BASE COMMANDER**

In the 2016/2017 fiscal year, approximately 9% of the annual operating budget came from the Base Commander. This funding is directed to site-specific and enhanced mandated services.

#### MILITARY FAMILY SERVICES

Approximately 43% of the annual operating budget for the 2015/2016 fiscal year came from Military Family Services to provide the Military Family Services Program (MFSP) to Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) families

This funding provides mandated services as set out in the annual funding application submitted to MFS for the provision of the MFSP.

These funds ensure that all military families may access similar programs of consistent quality on any CAF base where they may be stationed.

#### Mandated services include:

- Personal Development and Community Integration
- Child and Youth Development & Parenting Support
- Mental Health and Wellness
- Family Separation and Reunion
- Veteran Family Support

#### PROGRAM FEES AND OTHER FUNDING

Approximately 34% of the annual operating budget for the 2016/2017 fiscal year came from fees received directly from participants or organizations/agencies utilizing various user funded programs and services.

#### **FUND DEVELOPMENT**

Funds are raised from a variety of avenues, which include general donations and regular sales of yellow ribbon merchandise. In addition, event-specific fundraising initiatives are hosted every year by the MFRC, in cooperation with various partners, sponsors and donors.

Approximately 14% of the annual operating budget for the 2016/2017 fiscal year came from fund development activities.

A new initiative was developed this year. The first Curl for the Troops Bonspiel was held on March 11, 2017 where members of the local business community as well as military members joined to raise funds for the MFRC.



# **TOTAL YELLOW RIBBON MERCHANDISE SALES: \$2,564.96**

The Yellow Ribbon represents a visible show of support for military members and their families. A total of \$2,564.96 was raised from sales during the St. Albert Market Days, Edmonton Airshow, the Petroleum Golf Tournament and through a partnership at Christmas time in Servus Credit Union Banks throughout the area.

#### CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS

MFRC's Children's Programs offered a variety of quality programming this year with the integral help of skilled staff as well as valued partner agencies. It's essential to offer a wide variety of programming in order to meet the unique needs of this community.

MFRC Children's Programs included: Day Care, Out of School Care, Casual Care, Playschool, Terrific Twos, Drop-In Playgroup. Child Development Programs included: Children's Art Program and Lil' Picasso. Children's Programs which had direct parental involvement included: Books for Babies, Parents and Tots, Rhymes that Bind, and Daddy and Me.

Our 11 week Terrific Twos program was run three times with each session was filled to capacity. The talented team of educators who run and facilitate Terrific Twos, gave parents a well needed break from the challenges of parenting a two year old. The MFRC received a lot of positive feedback about this program and is looking to build on the success in the upcoming year.

Another program of note this year was Parents and Tots, with deployments looming large for some families in this community, Parents and Tots gave parents an outlet to address their fears and concerns to a group of peers. Parents and Tots built family resiliency through not only education, but helped families build a peer support system with others in similar situations to their own. The MFRC's Deployment Coordinator also sat in one week to speak with parents to answer any questions and provide useful resources.

Cornerstone programs at the MFRC include the accredited Day Care and Out-of-School Care (OOSC) programs. These programs provide an inclusive and positive environment for children aged 12 months to 12 years to learn. The children of the Day Care and OOSC took part in a few on base field trips this year including; LdSH, Fire Hall and 408 Squadron as well as a few off base trips; 4 Cats Art Studio, Cineplex, Laser Quest and more.

The MFRC can help Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) families who qualify, with unexpected and unique child care challenges by supporting them through facilitating short-term emergency child care requirements. The Centre also works with families to help them craft family care plans to combat the unique challenges of military life. Having this plan in place before unforeseeable challenges arise leads to more resilient and well-equipped military families. The MFRC provided 3 flights for families in need of Emergency Child Care.

Children's Program area staff attended a variety of training including: CAFRA Community of Learners Event, Pedagogical Pathways Educator Learning Series: Thinking Together, Steps Along the Pathways, High Five Workshop, Dealing with Difficult People, Powerful Play, and Out of School Time Collaborative Conference.

In partnership with the MFRC's Mental Health Team and Alberta Health Services, the Children's Program area started offering the Alberta Health Services Health for Two program in the fall of 2016. Health for Two offers pre and post-natal information, nutrition supplements such as milk coupons and prenatal vitamins, and promotes the health of mothers and babies. It also addresses the needs of individual women through support and referrals if necessary.

Moving forward, Children's Program area will strengthen its relationships with outside agencies, continue to provide quality programming and aim to increase the reach of Health for Two. The MFRC will also be looking at offering an on-site Professional Development Day for Children's Program's staff.



#### YOUTH PROGRAMS

The MFRC offers both structured and non-structured programs, social opportunities and leisure activities for youth aged 9 to 17 from military families.

Youth Programs included: Babysitting Courses, Home Alone Safety Courses and the Dove Workshops. Some of the most popular programs offered through the MFRC Youth Centre include the Youth Dances and a Kingsway Mall Shopping Trip.

The MFRC Youth Centre had a strong partnership with the University of Alberta (UofA) in three different faculties. A student from the Human Ecology program lead the youth in a "Mindful Youth" workshop, which was designed to give youth a better understanding of themselves and their unique environment. Students from the Drama-Education department visited the youth centre and taught the kids drama games and exercises. Lastly the UofA Nursing program lead the youth in discussions around important topics like, sugar intake, cyber-bullying and self-esteem.



Some other new initiatives at the MFRC Youth Centre included themed weeks in the busy summer months, French Club and daily Homework Help. Homework Help was very well received and the centre even hosted a Jeopardy style game to help review for finals.

In partnership with Guthrie School, 8 groups of 20 students (grades 4-9) participated in Saffron's Internet Safety and Bullying Awareness programs.



One of the biggest challenges that youth in the Edmonton military community faced this year was the increased number of deployed parents. The Youth Centre tackled this head on by making the MFRC Youth Worker more available to the youth on their schedule, such as Friday evenings. A map was also hung in the Centre so youth could have a visual of where their parents were deployed.

Moving forward, the MFRC Youth Centre will be rerunning the most popular theme weeks from the previous summer. The Centre will continue to build its partnership with the UofA. Lastly, there will be an increased focus on health education, covering such topics as healthy alternatives for drinks and snacks, healthy living habits and mental health awareness.



# SUPPORT FOR FAMILIES WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

#### YEAR AT A GLANCE

The MFRC offers confidential support, information and referrals to individuals with disabilities as well as caregivers of children, youth, and adults with disabilities.

One-on-one sessions are available with the Program Manager where families can receive a tailored list of resources as well as assistance navigating local and provincial support services to meet the unique needs of each family which can be invaluable to those families that are new to Alberta.

The Special Needs Support Group will continue to offer parent information and networking opportunities tailored to meet their needs.

#### FAMILY SEPARATION AND REUNION

#### **DEPLOYMENT SUPPORT**

Deployment Support offers programs and services to military families before, during and after periods of separation.

Some of the programming and special events that were offered this year included; Pizza/Movie Nights, monthly coffees, Road to Mental Readiness Workshops, the Christmas Lights Tour, Mobile Planetarium, Operation Care Package, Wool and Whatever, Wreath Making and Zentangle Workshops.

With the increased number of deployments, the community embraced the opportunity to be more involved in the pre-deployment phase by engaging in programs which promote positive mental preparedness and resiliency. This increase in tempo meant we saw an increase of support to families who have never experienced an overseas deployment.

There was an increase in the number of Unit/Wing Family Support Coordinators who reached out to the MFRC asking for Pre-Deployment Briefings for the families of those who were being deployed.

In response to the community wishes to be prepared for upcoming deployments, a legal documents workshop was also added called "What you need to know, before they go". This program educates spouses and military members on the type of paperwork they should have to protect their family and loved ones while they are away including; Power of Attorney, Temporary Guardianship, Will, Personal Directive and more.

The the Telus World of Science Mobile Planetarium was popular with families! Programs were offered collaboratively between several of the MFRC's program areas. An "Indoor Camping" program was offered to families which included a dinner of wieners and s'mores. Families sang camp songs, enjoyed space themed crafts and then went stargazing in the planetarium. The Planetarium was also opened up as a drop-in with crafts, games and books, and included a sci-fi photo booth.

The Operation Care Package workshop helped families prepare a holiday parcel for shipment in time to mail overseas for Christmas. Attendees were able to get a professional festive portrait taken to put in their care packages for their loved ones in time for Christmas. Families were also treated to a catered lunch. Children made a special craft and decorated a cookies to enjoy.

#### THE MFRC ATTENDED 16 ARRIVALS & DEPARTURES

Moving forward, our deployment program will be supporting an even greater number of families. We are working to strengthen our partnerships with rear-parties, offer up-to-date programs, services and resources.

A Deployment Project Assistant will be hired to support the current tempo. This position will assist making deployment warmline calls, planning & delivering programs, as well as administrative responsibilities.

In the upcoming year Deployment Support will work harder to recognize and acknowledge that military families are diverse and not everyone is supporting children. To addresses this, an adult only program called Wool & Whatever will be added. It is geared to those that are 18+ to engage and interact with other adults who are in the same phase of deployment.

#### **NEW TO EDMONTON**

The MFRC assists families ease their transition to living in the Edmonton area by offering helpful information upon arrival. Welcome packages are available in either English or French, pre-posting packages can be mailed upon request. Packages are tailored for families, singles and youth. A tour of the Centre is offered to the family, and signing up to receive a welcome call is encouraged.

The MFRC continues to partner with Calian and Medicentres to address the shortage of family physicians in the area.

The MFRC also offered a new program for families who are posted outside of the normal posting season. The Community Luncheon is collaboration between different departments of the Edmonton Garrison MFRC and external organizations to bring information and camaraderie to families new to the area or to those who have live here for a while and are looking to learn a little more about this great community. The program also provided an opportunity to meet other families in the area, and to converse and share stories about life in the Canadian Armed Forces. April's Community Luncheon featured guest speaker Emma Potter from the Support Network 211 line and was followed by lunch and a tour of the MFRC.





#### LANGUAGE SERVICES

The MFRC Second Language Services helps military families improve or maintain their second language skills. This department also assists Francophone families with personal, family, and community integration to enable them to function with increased comfort in English and in their new community.

Language Services offers programs and services such as French Pizza Movie Night, Francophone Coffees, and employment assistance and referral.

Once again, the St. Jean Baptiste Day event was a huge success. Attendance was over 250 people and La Poutine's food truck was back again serving up authentic Quebec poutine. A new addition this year was ice cream from the Blue Giraffe food truck.

One of Language Services main aims is to act as a bridge between Francophone families new to Alberta and the resources and training that will help them succeed here. They are linked up with Association canadienne-française de l'Alberta and Accès Emploi as well as offering a variety second language training making them resilient and more at home.

Looking to the future, Alberta just introduced its first French Policy. The French Policy outlines the guiding principles the Government of Alberta will use to help maintain existing and develop new French language services and supports. As this policy rolls out the hope is that it will get easier for the Francophone Families to integrate into the community.

#### **EMPLOYMENT AND EDUCATION**

The MFRC can assist Defence Community families, who are looking for employment, resume tips and post-secondary education resources and scholarships.

MFRC Educational programs included: First Aid courses, Scrapbooking, Military 101, and Family Law.

This year the MFRC saw a significant increase in the amount of spouses connecting for employment support. They were connected with our partner agencies METSpouse and Forces@Work.

The METSpouse Program is an employer network, administered by Canada Company and Military Family Services. All of the organizations listed on the Military Spouse Friendly Employers section are committed to working with military spouses as they seek sustainable employment that has the possibility to move with them.

The Prospect Human Services Forces@WORK program will assist family members of serving personnel find rewarding careers. The program is offered at no cost.

The MFRC's computer lab is stocked with employment and education resources such as job postings, scholarship information, post-secondary brochures and several booklets with resources on resume preparation.

Helmets 2 Hardhats will soon be extending their career services to military spouses and their children over the age of 18. This program is a partnership with Canada's Building Trades Unions, their many employers across Canada, and government stakeholders.

#### **MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT**

The MFRC's Family Support Workers offer free, short-term, confidential support to CAF members and their families. Military life presents unique challenges to families; the MFRC will assist in the navigation of the programs and services available.

Information and Referral service goes beyond handing out contact information, the Mental Health Team provides support on behalf of the family to get them access to services and helped them navigate road blocks. Assistance was provided to families with access to funds through the Support our Troops Fund, the Poppy Fund and the Alberta Works Flee Fund. These funds help individuals facing crisis situations and those in need of basic necessities, as well as comfort items for children after a traumatic event.

As key members of the Base Family Violence Advisory Team and the Family Violence Team, the MFRC is connected to the military community including, the Padres, Military Police, Base Psycho Social and other community agencies and policing units who can help us better support families dealing with domestic abuse. The Mental Health and Wellness team hosted a round table with members of the Edmonton Police Service's (EPS) Victim Services and Court workers. They discussed best practices for supporting families that are dealing with domestic violence and were informed on how victims of domestic violence can access support through the EPS.

Programs for children and youth included; Individual Success Through Empowering Peers (iSTEP), Dove Self Esteem Workshop, Yak and Gobble, Take it Easy, Competent Kids, Kids 4 Camera Info Session, and Bell Let's Talk Youth Evening. Programs for adults included: Operation Stress Injury Caregiver Group, Family Law Information Session, Health for Two, iSTEP Parent Workshop, and Compass Caregiver Group.

Moving forward, the Mental Health and Wellness team is excited about offering the Kids 4 Cameras program as a full eight week program in partnership with Kids4Cameras, a non-profit that works with youth across the City of Edmonton to engage them with the power of photography. This program offers weekly photography workshops for youth on themes such as happiness, details, silhouettes, and reflection.

The Mental Health Team observed the following challenges, issues and concerns with their clients:
Anxiety, Anger Management, Child-Parent Relationship Issues, Child/Youth Behavioural Issues, Deployment Related Issues, Depressions and/or other Mental Health, Difficulties with Employment, Family member with an OSI, Family Violence, Financial difficulties, Grief/Loss/Bereavement, Other, Physical Injuries / Health Issues, Posting Related Issues, PTSD, Relationship / Marriage Difficulties, Suicidal Ideation, Transition / Adaptation Difficulties, and Vicarious Trauma.

# MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS

The MH&W Team has seen an increase in mental health issues for children and youth; in response, in the spring of 2016, a pilot Youth program was launched. The MFRC Youth Worker, as part of the Mental Health Team, provides guidance and support to families with youth ages 9-17 either in person, by email or over the phone.

The MFRC's Youth Worker developed and implemented 5 new peer support programs targeted to youth ages 9-14. This position has provided a unique resource to youth and parents of youth looking for mental health support.

The Youth Worker offers evening appointments and adapted office hours including Friday evenings while the Youth Centre is open. Having the Youth Worker from the MH&W team built into Youth Centre programming has built a bridge between professional mental health services and the youth. The youth worker has also offered monthly Psycho-educational youth groups for children and youth ages of 9 - 14. These youth identify with looking for additional support and ideas to build self-esteem, understand anxiety and how to deal with normal teen friendship conflicts as well as coping with unique military lifestyle challenges.

"I am forever thankful for the youth worker that I was able to connect my daughter with. During that time, the youth worker was a sounding board, a shoulder to cry on and most of all she became a cheerleader and encouraged my daughter to power through a difficult time in her life."

#### VETERAN FAMILY PILOT PROGRAM

Over the past year, the Veteran Family Program (VFP) continued to support medically releasing members, medically released veterans, and their families as they navigated the transition from the military to the civilian lifestyle. Support was provided by means of information about the release process timeline, appropriate resources, skill-building workshops, and opportunities to connect with others living similar experiences. These services were and continue to be integral elements in the support of the VFP demographic.

The Veteran Family Program Information Nights were an excellent way for the community to learn about the program and to connect with others experiencing the transition to the civilian life.

The VFP fosters resiliency in its clients by providing information on:

- The release process
- The transition process
- Resources appropriate to the various stages of release/transition, including Defence Community Resources available before, during and after transition, as well as civilian resources to aid in the adaptation to post-military life.

The Veteran Family Coordinator has a number of excellent programs planned for upcoming year including, Shifting Gears, VFP Information Nights, Employment Tune-Up workshops, Self-Care for the Caregiver workshop, a workshop on transition facilitated by a subject matter expert.

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
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




















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
