# About the MFRC

### **ABOUT US**

The Edmonton Garrison Military Family Resource Centre (MFRC) is a charitable, non-profit organization registered under the Alberta Society's Act. The agency is also registered with Revenue Canada as a charitable organization.

The MFRC is committed to enriching the lives of individuals and families in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) through positive action, education, and support.

Absences from family support systems, difficulties during deployments, solo parenting or coping with an injury or loss are realities for military families, realities which can have a significant impact on family well-being.

For over 30 years, the MFRC has been committed to supporting military families as they navigate these unique challenges through programs and services that enhance the strength and resilience of military families.

### **OUR STRUCTURE**

We are governed by a volunteer Board of Directors comprised of military family members, CAF members, and ex-officio members. The MFRC depends on the talents and skills of these dedicated volunteers to make guiding decisions. At least 51% of the Board membership must be family members of full-time serving CAF personnel. Qualified staff from a variety of backgrounds direct and coordinate MFRC programs and services.

### **MISSION**

The Edmonton Garrison Military Family Resource Centre supports military families as they navigate the unique challenges of military life through programs and services that enhance their strength and resilience.

### **CORE VALUE STATEMENT**

Strong military families are the foundation of the Canadian Armed Forces.



# **Funding**

The MFRC is funded through four separate but equally important sources: the Base Commander; Military Family Services (MFS); program fees/other; and fund development.

### **BASE COMMANDER**

For the 2022/23 fiscal year, approximately 10% of the annual operating budget came from the Base Commander. This funding is directed to site-specific and enhanced mandated services.

### MILITARY FAMILY SERVICES

For the 2022/23 fiscal year, approximately 48% of the annual operating budget came from Military Family Services to provide the Military Family Services Program to Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) and Veteran families.

Military Family Services provides MFRCs funding to provide the Military Family Services Program (MFSP) to Canadian Armed Forces and Veteran families.

This funding is provided for mandated services set out in the annual funding application submitted to MFS. This process ensures that all military families may access similar programs of consistent quality at any CAF base. These mandated services for 2022/23 included:

- Supporting families while members are on work-related absences
- Supporting families relocating to the Edmonton area
- Mental health and wellness
- Child and youth development
- Veteran family support

### PROGRAM FEES AND OTHER FUNDING

For the 2022/23 fiscal year, approximately 27% of the annual operating budget came from provincial funds as well as fees from user-funded programs and services. This funding is from fees collected directly from families enrolled in user-funded programs and services, plus provincial funding.

### **FUND DEVELOPMENT**

For the 2022/23 fiscal year, approximately 15% of the annual operating budget came from funds raised through a variety of sources including donations, proceeds from the sale of yellow ribbon merchandise, and special events.



# **Fund Development**

As we came out of COVID, the MFRC was once again able to start hosting a few of our annual fundraising events. The MFRC garnered significant support from neighbouring communities, including Sturgeon County who organized a successful golf tournament, with funds directed to the MFRC. The MFRC received continuing support from the Frontline Celebrity Golf Tournament and the Tim Horton's Smile Cookie campaign, who both outdid themselves.

The MFRC extends its gratitude to the individuals within our community who consistently purchase Yellow Ribbon merchandise and ornaments, demonstrating unwavering support for military families.

The MFRC demonstrated agility by adapting its fundraising strategy and diversifying funding streams to align with the prevailing economic climate.

### WELCOME AND COMMUNITY INTEGRATION

The faster a military family gets settled into and connected with their new community, the better they fare. The MFRC helps families before, during and after they relocate.

For families about to move to Edmonton, our Relocation team offers pre-posting packages and customized information on the Edmonton area.

When families arrive in Edmonton, they get a welcome package full of useful information including:

- MFRC services and other base service providers
- Switching to Alberta health care and licenses
- Francophone resources
- Education and employment resources
- Points of interest to help families start exploring their new home

CAF members can also ask our Relocation team to reach out to their families. These welcome calls and emails help family members learn about their community and ask any specific questions they have. Welcome packages are customized as we offer baby, youth and pet packages.

This year we saw the start of a new program called Community Meet Ups. This program was designed to give our families opportunities to explore the community in and around Edmonton and participate in fun activities together. Our goal was to help people make friends, find support, explore different interests and foster a sense of community.

Our major annual community event, Fall Fest, was planned with approximately 900 individuals registered. This event was cancelled out of respect for the mourning period of the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

- 219 families received welcome packages, 199 in English and 20 in French
- 511 single members received welcome packages
- 84 baby welcome packages were distributed
- 72 youth welcome packages were distributed
- 137 pet welcome packages were distributed
- 47 families received pre-posting packages
- 181 families received welcome calls, and 261 families received a welcome email
- 100 families received general navigation assistance and referrals
- 14 building tours were provided
- 50 families received MFRC support to submit applications for Support Our Troops funding that helps newly relocated families access clubs, activities and sports in their new community

### **EDUCATION AND EMPLOYMENT**

In 2022/23, we had 10% more families contact us for employment support as the provincial unemployment rates increased in a few sectors.

The MFRC helped individuals update their resumes, gave helpful advice for improving their job search, and linked individuals with local employment agencies that matched their skills and expertise. In 2022/23 we continued to provide entrepreneurial resources to military families interested in owning a business.

Families also came to the MFRC for help finding education programs, ranging from where they could receive first aid training to improve their skills, to what French-language post-secondary options were available.


A highlight in our employment support was a partnership with the Trenton MFRC to develop and co-host a short podcast on when to disclose a disability when you are looking for work. The podcasts are on Spotify under "Your Employment Detective". This partnership will continue moving forward into the new fiscal year.

The MFRC was pleased to once again offer in-person practicum students. Through a partnership with MacEwan University, we had a social work practicum student complete 400 hours.

Thanks to this program I was able to take bookkeeping courses through NAIT and it helped me gain full-time, meaningful employment as an accounts receivable administrator.

- 92 adults accessed employment information and referral support
- 24 adults and 2 youth accessed education information and referral support
- 15 families received MFRC support to submit applications for Support Our Troops education funding
- 4 adults attended the Careers Under Construction session
- 18 attended our Standard First Aid courses



### SUPPORT FOR FAMILIES WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

From the point a family is posted to Edmonton to well after they've moved in, the MFRC provides support for families as supports for special needs differs greatly between provinces.

The MFRC helps families navigate what programs, services and financial support are available, and connects families with local support systems for families with similar needs. In 2022/23 we had 43% more individuals contact us for one-on-one support services.

Three families received support from the MFRC in applying for funding from Support Our Troops to assist in covering the cost of assessment fees.

- 55 family members received one-one-one support through our special needs services
- 24 individuals were referred to community organizations
- 8 individuals took part in the Parent Peer Connect Support Group "Friendship Matters in Education" session



### **LANGUAGE SERVICES**

Registrations for our language courses continued to remain strong in 2022/23:

- Skill assessments are done on an ongoing basis, then we offer a course at the level that works for the greatest number of individuals.
- Courses are offered online so learners outside Edmonton can join.
- By partnering with other MFRCs, we can coordinate what levels we're offering so learners can be referred to another class if one isn't being offered locally.

The Rencontre Café Frenchy program grew and attracted CAF members and people with another first language other than French. Participants are seeing each other outside of our monthly meetings and building their support networks.

Language Services was also very busy supporting MFRC programs and services, to be delivered in a bilingual format.

To help our Francophone community feel at home, the MFRC offered our first in-person Saint-Jean-Baptiste celebration since COVID with an attendance of 180 individuals. For March's Month of the Francophonie, we were able to hold a sugar shack for the students of Guthrie School.

- 18 Rosetta Stone licenses were issued
- 43 students attended online second language classes
- 58 individuals accessed language services support
- **257** children attended the Month of the Francophonie sugar shack at Guthrie School
- 17 individuals attended the "Plant A Seed, Read!" partnered program



# **Absence Support**

It was a busy start to the year with families experiencing multiple waves of separation throughout training, courses, and deployments, both foreign and domestic.

With family needs in mind, the absence programming for 2022/23 focused on giving families opportunities to connect and share experiences that encourage family bonding as well as prepare them for challenges that occur before, during and after a work-related absence. Programs like Stronger Relationships with the 5 Love Languages, Op Coffee, and Plant Your Roots were well received and had more registrations than previous years. Private sessions of R2MR continued to be popular as each session was tailored to meet the specific needs and concerns of a family.

This year, we strived to reconnect families who are experiencing a work-related absence to the MFRC and resources via monthly check-in emails. The response to the monthly and re-integration check-ins that were sent was amazing. Families greatly appreciate the time and energy we put into ensuring they are supported during this challenging time.

# **Outreach and Community Integration**

Raising awareness of the MFRC and ensuring we are a part of our community is crucial to helping families know how we are there to support them.

To celebrate the Month of the Military Child (MOMC), families were invited to participate in a celebration of Teal Up Day to recognize military children and youth for their contributions as part of the military community. Youth were invited to participate in paint nights and movie nights throughout the month of April to celebrate being a military youth. All programming focused on educating and discussing resiliency sharing, what it means to be a military child and how it's different for everyone.

The MFRC's e-newsletter and social media channels continue to be an effective way to reach families, and as restrictions lifted the MFRC was also invited to do more briefings with military and community groups. Event organizers also began to donate tickets to events again, which helped families explore their community.

- 16 Month of the Military Child take home paint kits were distributed to families
- 7 youth attended the Month of the Military Child Movie Night
- 17 youth attended the Month of the Military Child Paint Night
- 15 briefings were given to 187 individuals
- 11 outreach/awareness activities attended and connected with 550 individual military family members
- The MFRC e-newsletter was opened 57,334 times
- MFRC social media channels reached 80,470 people, with 7,005 engagements
- 4,948 donated tickets were distributed



# **Mental Health and Wellness**

Military and veteran families face unique barriers and due to the nature of the military lifestyle, navigating some of these challenges can be isolating. The MFRC Mental Health and Wellness Team provides an integral part of services to our military and veteran families as they navigate these challenges, whether that be through crisis intervention, counselling, system navigation, or mental health and wellness programming.

The Mental Health and Wellness team are responsive and adaptable to the needs of our military and veteran families. This team is able to pivot their focus quickly to prioritize programs and services based on trends happening in the community.

In the fiscal year 2022/23 the Mental Health team provided a record number of direct client care hours of 5,200, with an average of 15 new intakes a week, along with a caseload of approximately 20 regular clients.

This fiscal year saw an increase of mental health challenges for youth, including suicidal ideation within the community, which prompted the team to shift their priorities to providing services and programs for youth and parents of youth with mental health challenges.

Additional programs in this area consisted of Mindfulness Coaching, Coping Skills Bootcamp for youth ages 8-12 and our new Moms Support Group.

In October, the MFRC and other base partners worked to raise awareness for the national Healthy Relationships Campaign through a variety of means including indoor/outdoor banners and social media platforms.

In 2022/23, the Mental Health team had:

- 145 adult clients
- 6 veteran clients
- 92 youth clients
- 150 information and referral contacts (not considered client files)
- Financial support was accessed by 9 families

# **Mental Health and Wellness**

### **EMERGENCY SUPPORT**

Military families are encouraged to have a Family Care Plan (FCP) to support their child care needs when the member is required to be at work. In saying this families may sometimes face situations where conditions of service in the CAF prove too challenging for the FCP to accommodate. When this happens, additional child care support may be available through the MFRC by way of subsidizing a child care request through direct child care services, expense reimbursement or through the coordination of independent care services on a short-term basis.

Parents/guardians speak with a Mental Health and Wellness Support Worker, in-person or over the phone, who assist by developing a plan that best suits the well-being of the family and children during this stressful time.

Requests for Emergency Family Care Assistance (EFCA) remained strong for 2022/23 with the Mental Health and Wellness Team helping families create a FCP, and/or providing assistance to support other avenues for child care as required.

### **Emergency Family Care Assistance**

- 14 families received 327.25 hours of care through the EFCA program
- 16 children were provided emergency child care
- 3 families got assistance developing their family care plan



# Child and Youth

### **CHILD CARE**

The MFRC's Day Care, Playschool and Terrific Twos programs provides an inclusive, encouraging environment for children to learn through play. Due to ongoing staffing challenges the MFRC Day Care program was not able to function at full capacity in the 2022/2023 fiscal year.

### **CHILD AND YOUTH PROGRAMMING**

As in the past years, the MFRC continues to offer a variety of activities and programs to promote healthy child and youth development as well as parenting support programs. The MFRC's child and youth programs for 2022/23 focused on offering in person programming and early childhood development while building supportive connections with others. Families were very happy to come back and have face-to-face interactions with others.

Some of the more popular programs include Stay and Play, registered youth programs, Kids Connection Corner and Go Girl. Participants from Stay and Play appreciate the opportunity to connect with other families and develop friendships from the group. Several families began connecting with one another by:

- Inquiring about one another if not attending Stay and Play
- Dropping off supplies to one another when sick
- Reconnecting with one another outside of the playgroup
- Reaching out to one another for support

In partnership with Sturgeon County and the Garrison Fitness Centre, Go Girl was offered this summer to promote an active and healthy lifestyle for girls 9-17.

# **Child and Youth**

### **YOUTH CENTRE**

The MFRC was able to reopen the Youth Centre in August of 2022 following the lifting of COVID-19 restrictions. The newly renovated space underwent several upgrades prior to opening which included new paint, furniture, games and supplies for youth to enjoy.

This space offers a safe and supportive environment for youth 9-17 to explore, create, and build positive relationships with their peers through registered and drop-in programs. Youth who hold a membership to the Youth Centre can come to explore video games, computers, art and science materials, board games, air hockey and more. Youth can participate in all the activities offered throughout the space while having fun with their peers, learning social skills and building confidence.

The Youth Centre slowly expanded their hours throughout the year and saw returning youth as well as new youth attend.
